ORDINANCE 232-2025

AMENDMENT TO FENCES AND WALLS

WHEREAS, Section 5-213 of the Local Government Article of the Maryland Annotated Code and Section C-401(B)(62) of the Charter of the City of Taneytown grants the Mayor and City Council with the authority to adopt zoning regulations.

WHEREAS, the City has become aware that modifications are needed relating to the administration of fence and wall regulations; and

WHEREAS, the City Council intends to reduce administrative requirements regarding fences and walls for both property owners and City staff; and

WHEREAS, the Taneytown Planning and Zoning Commission have reviewed the proposed Ordinance at their November 24, 2025 meeting and voted to recommend that the Mayor and City Council for the City of Taneytown approve and adopt the proposed ordinance; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the requirements of Section 4-203 of the Land Use Article of the Maryland Annotated Code, the Mayor and City Council of the City of Taneytown have advertised and held a public hearing on this matter on ~~December 3, 2025~~January 7, 2026 to receive public comment; and

WHEREAS, after considering the matter, and the Planning and Zoning and public comment related there to have decided it is in the best interests of the citizens of Taneytown to implement said Ordinance.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TANEYTOWN THAT:

SECTION 1:

That Section 205-30 Fences and walls be amended as follows

Notwithstanding other provisions of this Code, fences and walls shall be permitted in any required yard subject to the following provisions:

A.

No fence or wall in or along the sides of any required front yard shall exceed four feet in height.

B.

Except for a retaining wall, no fence or wall, which exceeds six feet in height, shall be permitted in any required side or rear yards in any residential district.

C.

Except for a retaining wall, no fence or wall, which exceeds 10 feet in height, shall be permitted in any required side or rear yards in any commercial or industrial district.

D.

All fences and walls will be restricted to a maximum height of four feet, except for those fences and walls located within the rear yards and those portions of the side yards to the rear of the front corner of the dwelling structure, which will be restricted to a maximum height of six feet, except as herein set forth.

E.

All fences or walls must have a minimum clearance to allow for stormwater management.

F.

~~All applications for permits in accordance with this article must be accompanied by a sketch plan of the proposed fence or wall and a location plat of the property, together with such application fee as established by the Council.~~

FG.

~~No fence or wall shall be erected, replaced, altered or relocated within any City easement or right or way without written permission by the City. a permit issued by the Zoning Administrator. The permit application shall be signed by the applicant, and when the applicant is any person other than the owner of the property, the permit application shall also be signed by the owner of the property, and shall contain the location of the fence or wall, a drawing showing the design and location of the fence or wall and such other pertinent information as the Zoning Administrator may require to ensure compliance with the laws of the City.~~

All fences and walls lawfully existing on the date of the passage of this section may remain on the premises, until such time as it becomes unsafe, or beyond repair in the opinion of

~~the zoning administrator. any ownership of the premises is sold or otherwise transferred, at which time there shall be complete compliance with the provisions of this section.~~

~~The fence or wall permit shall become null and void if the fence or wall has not been completed within a period of six months after the date of the permit.~~

No fence or wall shall be erected or located so as to obstruct a public right-of-way. The property owner shall be responsible to maintain the fence or wall in good repair so that no portion thereof shall impede or obstruct any public right-of-way.

Any person who violates this article shall be subject to the provisions of § **205-90** of the Code of the City of Taneytown, Maryland.

CHARTER RESOLUTION NO. CR 2026 - 01

A CHARTER RESOLUTION of the Mayor and Council of the City of Taneytown, Maryland, adopting term limits for the offices of Mayor and Councilperson, and providing a limited exception for appointments to fill Council vacancies when no eligible candidate is available; providing for applicability beginning with the May 2027 election.

WHEREAS, the City Charter provides that the Mayor serves a four-year term and is elected as set forth in § C-301, and the Charter sets qualifications for Mayor in § C-302;

WHEREAS, the City Charter provides that Councilpersons serve four-year terms and sets Councilperson qualifications in §§ C-201 and C-202 (with staggered elections as set forth in § C-510);

WHEREAS, the City Charter provides for succession to the office of Mayor by the Mayor Pro Tem under § C-205;

WHEREAS, the City Charter provides for filling Council vacancies, including in § C-519;

WHEREAS, regular City elections occur on the first Monday in May of every other year under § C-509;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TANEYTOWN, MARYLAND, that the Charter of the City of Taneytown is hereby amended as follows:

Section 1. Term limits for Mayor — Amend § C-302 (Qualifications).

§ C-302. Qualifications.

Add the following new paragraph at the end of § C-302:

Term Limits. No person shall be eligible for election to the office of Mayor who has previously served as Mayor for two (2) full terms (i.e., eight (8) years) in the aggregate. Service as Mayor includes service by election or by succession to the office. Service of more than two (2) years of an unexpired term shall be counted as a full term for purposes of this limitation.

This term-limit restriction applies only to eligibility for election and does not restrict succession to the office under § C-205.

Section 2. Term limits for Councilpersons — Amend § C-202 (Qualifications).

§ C-202. Qualifications.

Add the following new paragraph at the end of § C-202:

Term Limits. No person shall be eligible for election to the office of Councilperson who has previously served as a Councilperson for three (3) full terms (i.e., twelve (12) years) in the aggregate. Service as a Councilperson includes service by election or appointment to fill a vacancy. Service of more than two (2) years of an unexpired term shall be counted as a full term for purposes of this limitation.

Section 3. Vacancy appointment override when no eligible candidate is available — Amend § C-519.

A. Amend § C-519(A).

In § C-519(A), after the sentence:

“The Council shall then elect some qualified person to fill the vacancy on the Council for the remainder of the unexpired term.”

add the following sentence:

Notwithstanding any term-limit restriction in this Charter, if the Council determines that no eligible candidate is available to fill the vacancy (meaning no person is both qualified under the Charter and not disqualified by the term limits), the Council may appoint a qualified person without regard to the term limits to serve for the remainder of the unexpired term. The Council’s determination shall be made by motion and recorded in the minutes.

B. Amend § C-519(B)(1).

In § C-519(B)(1), after the sentence:

“In case of a vacancy on the Council for any reason, the Council shall appoint some qualified person to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term.”

add the following sentence:

Notwithstanding any term-limit restriction in this Charter, if the Council determines that no eligible candidate is available to fill the vacancy (meaning no person is both qualified under the Charter and not disqualified by the term limits), the Council may appoint a qualified person without regard to the term limits to serve for the remainder of the unexpired term. The Council's determination shall be made by motion and recorded in the minutes.

Section 4. Effective date; applicability beginning with the May 2027 election.

This Charter Resolution shall take effect on the date provided by the Charter and applicable Maryland law governing charter amendments.

Applicability. Notwithstanding the effective date stated above, the term-limit eligibility provisions adopted by Sections 1 and 2 of this Charter Resolution (and the related vacancy-fill language in Section 3) shall apply to candidacies filed for, and to any regular municipal election held on, the first Monday in May 2027, and to all regular or special municipal elections thereafter. (Anchor: regular city elections are on the first Monday in May every other year under § C-509.)

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon adoption, this Charter Resolution shall be handled, publicized, and filed as required by the Charter and applicable Maryland law.

CHARTER RESOLUTION NO. CR2026 - 02

A CHARTER RESOLUTION TO AMEND § C-519 (“REMOVAL FROM OFFICE”) TO (I) LIMIT COUNCIL REMOVAL TO POST-CENSURE, DUTY-RELATED, FINAL CRIMINAL CONVICTIONS AND (II) AUTHORIZE RECALL BY PETITION WITHOUT CENSURE WITH A 25% SIGNATURE THRESHOLD

WHEREAS, § C-519 currently authorizes the City Council to remove an elected official for “Just Cause” by majority vote after written charges and a public hearing; and provides that such action is not subject to the Mayor’s veto power, but the Mayor may vote to break a tie;

WHEREAS, § C-519 currently authorizes recall only after censure, requires the recall petition to set forth the Act of Censure, and requires signatures equal to not less than twenty percent (20%) of the qualified registered voters of the City;

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council desire to (a) retain Council removal authority but narrowly limit it to situations involving a duty-related criminal conviction that is final after direct appeal and that occurs following censure, and (b) preserve the voters’ ability to pursue recall without any censure prerequisite while increasing the petition threshold to twenty-five percent (25%);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TANEYTOWN, MARYLAND, that the Charter is hereby amended as follows:

Section 1. Amendment of § C-519(B) (Council removal standard and procedure).

§ C-519(B) is amended by deleting the existing subsection and replacing it with the following:

“B. Council Removal Following Censure and Duty-Related Final Criminal Conviction.

(1) **Standard.** An elected official may be removed from office by a majority vote of the City Council only if:

- (a) the Mayor and Council have adopted an Act of Censure against the elected official; and
- (b) the elected official has been convicted, by a judge or a jury, of a crime arising out of or directly related to the official’s duties or actions taken in an official capacity; and
- (c) the conviction is final, meaning the time for filing any direct appeal has expired or any direct appeal has been finally resolved and the conviction has been affirmed.

(2) **Charges and Hearing.** Removal under this subsection shall occur only after the Council issues a written charge or charges identifying the Act of Censure and the conviction and holds a public hearing on the matter.

(3) **Veto/Tie Vote.** Such action is not subject to the veto power of the Mayor, but the Mayor may vote to break a tie.

(4) **Limitation.** No elected official may be removed by the City Council except as expressly provided in this subsection.”

Section 2. Amendment of § C-519(C) and § C-519(C)(1)(c) (Recall; remove censure prerequisite; raise threshold to 25%).

A. Amend the opening sentence of § C-519(C) to remove the censure precondition.

§ C-519(C) is amended as follows:

“C. Recall. Any elected official, may be petitioned for recall and removed from office for any reason by the qualified voters of the City of Taneytown, in accordance with the following provisions.”

B. Amend § C-519(C)(1)(c) to remove “Act of Censure” petition content and increase the signature threshold.

§ C-519(C)(1)(c) is amended as follows:

“(c) A Recall Petition shall: (1) identify the elected official whose recall is sought and the office held; (2) contain any additional reasoning for Recall; (3) shall be signed by not less than (25%) twenty-five percent of the qualified registered voters of the City; and (4) shall request a Recall Election to be held for said office holder.”

Section 3. No other changes.

Except as expressly amended by this Charter Resolution, all remaining provisions of § C-519 shall remain in full force and effect, including the remaining recall procedures and recall election provisions.

Section 4. Severability.

If any provision of this Charter Resolution or its application is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications that can be given effect without the invalid provision or application.

Section 5. Effective date.

This Charter Resolution shall take effect as provided by applicable law.

AMENDMENT TO SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ARTICLE I, SECTION 176-2 OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF TANEYTOWN, MARYLAND, FOR THE PURPOSE OF AMMENDING GENERAL PROVISIONS RELATED TO THE REASONABLE REMOVAL OF SNOW AND ICE ON THE PUBLIC STREETS AND SIDEWALKS OF THE CITY OF TANEYTOWN.

SECTION 1:

That Section 176-2 be amended as follows

§ 176-2 Snow and ice removal.

A. Within ~~10-24~~ hours after the cessation of a snowfall, or a reasonable timeframe no less than 24 hours, as indicated by the City, the owners and/or occupants of all properties shall remove, or cause to be removed, such snow from the sidewalks abutting upon those properties to permit free and unencumbered passage of pedestrians upon the sidewalks and prevent an accumulation of ice or the creation of hazardous walking conditions.

B. In the event that the responsible person or persons shall fail to remove such snow upon the sidewalks or shall permit an accumulation of ice thereon or shall permit the sidewalks to remain in a hazardous condition for more than ~~24~~ hours after the cessation of any snowfall, or a reasonable timeframe no less than 24 hours as indicated by the City, then the City may, at the cost and expense of the responsible person or persons, cause the removal of that snow or ice or may make safe any hazardous condition resulting from an accumulation of snow or ice, which charge or expense shall be a lien upon the property affected and shall be collectible in the same manner as taxes levied upon such property. Any lien provided herein should be in addition to the penalty set forth for violation thereof and not in substitution therefor.

ORDINANCE 03 – 2026
BYPASS CORRIDOR DEVELOPMENT DEFERRAL

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the City of Taneytown (“City”) have a duty to protect and promote the public health, safety, and welfare, including the safe and efficient movement of traffic and the protection of all neighborhoods from excessive traffic, cut-through traffic, and traffic which degrades the peaceful enjoyment of the neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, the City, through the Transportation Element its 2010 Community Comprehensive plan, Carroll County, through their 2025 Transportation Priority Letter, and the State of Maryland as evidenced by their acquisition and retention of property for the purpose, have identified and/or studied a potential Southern Bypass corridor intended to address traffic congestion, neighborhood cut-through traffic, emergency response, and related safety concerns; and

WHEREAS, development activity within and adjacent to the potential Southern Bypass corridor as depicted in the 2007 Antrim Blvd Extension Corridor Study, and defined herein, may complicate, impair, or foreclose the City’s ability to preserve and secure the corridor, including necessary right-of-way, easements, dedications, alignments, and related corridor preservation tools; and

WHEREAS, The Taneytown Planning Commission, as part of an ongoing Comprehensive Plan update is working with City staff and consultants to refine and narrow the alignment options of the 2007 Corridor Study ; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council find that a temporary, targeted deferral on certain development approvals in the Southern Bypass corridor study area is a reasonable, time-limited measure to allow the City to coordinate with Property Owners, Developers, County and State partners, evaluate and implement traffic and safety planning, and pursue corridor preservation measures; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TANEYTOWN, MARYLAND, that:

SECTION 1. TITLE.

This Ordinance shall be known as the “Southern Bypass Corridor Development Deferral Ordinance.”

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS.

2.1 Deferral Area means the Southern Bypass Corridor Study Area as shown and described in Exhibit A.

2.2 Development means any activity requiring City approval for subdivision, resubdivision, site plan, land development plan, zoning certificate/zoning permit, building permit for new structures, grading permit, or any other permit or approval that authorizes:

- (a) a new residential dwelling, commercial, or industrial construction, or
- (b) expansion of building footprint for non-residential use, or
- (c) increase in intensity of use, reasonably expected to impact the adequacy of streets, roads and / or intersections in the City

2.3 Development Application means any application submitted to the City for an approval identified in Section 2.2.

2.4 Complete Application means an application that contains all forms, fees, plans, studies, and supporting documents required by City regulations for a filing determination.

2.5 Vested Right means any vested right recognized under applicable Maryland law.

SECTION 3. DEFERRAL ESTABLISHED.

3.1 Deferral Imposed. During the Deferral Period (Section 4), the City shall not approve any Development Application within the Deferral Area, except as expressly allowed in Section 5 (Exemptions) or Section 6 (Relief).

3.2 No Processing; Tolling. The City shall not accept Development Applications during the Deferral Period.

SECTION 4. DEFERRAL PERIOD; SUNSET.

4.1 Term (180 Days). The deferral shall begin on the Effective Date and shall remain in effect for one hundred eighty (180) days.

4.2 Extension. The Mayor and Council may extend the deferral by subsequent ordinance(s) if they make written findings that the extension remains necessary to accomplish the purposes of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. EXEMPTIONS.

This Ordinance does not apply to:

5.1 Public Projects / Utilities. City, County, State, or public utility projects necessary to protect public health and safety or maintain essential services, including emergency work and repairs for water, sewer, stormwater, electric, gas, and communications.

5.2 Repairs and Minor Work. Permits for interior renovations and ordinary repairs that do not add dwelling units, do not expand a commercial, institutional, or industrial building footprint, and do not increase intensity of use.

5.3 Safety Orders. Work required to comply with a lawfully issued order to abate unsafe conditions.

5.4 Previously Approved Projects. Projects for which the City has issued final site plan approval and/or final subdivision approval prior to the Effective Date may proceed to permitting and construction provided:

- (a) the project proceeds substantially in accordance with the final approval; and
- (b) no material modification is requested during the Deferral Period.

For purposes of this section, “material modification” includes any change that increases density, building footprint, floor area, trips, access points, or otherwise increases intensity or traffic impact beyond what was approved.

5.5 Bypass Preservation Actions. Any application or approval whose primary purpose is to advance corridor preservation (including dedications, easements, reservations, or related instruments) as determined by the City.

5.6 Development Rights and Responsibilities Agreements (DRRA). A project for which the Mayor and City Council have entered into a DRRA which advances construction of the

proposed bypass, secures right of ways or easements for the bypass, and for which construction activity will not commence until such easements or rights of way necessary to allow mitigation of adverse impact of traffic as determined by a traffic impact study have been obtained.

SECTION 6. TOLLING OF DEADLINES; FEES.

6.1 Tolling. Any deadlines for City action on Development Applications subject to this Ordinance are tolled during the Deferral Period, including any internal processing timelines that would otherwise run during the deferral.

SECTION 7. CITY WORK PLAN DURING DEFERRAL.

During the Deferral Period, the City shall pursue the following actions to the extent feasible:

7.1 Establish a Taneytown Bypass Task Force that will Coordinate with Carroll County, Developers, Property Owners and the State on the Southern Bypass corridor alignment, feasibility, easements and implementation steps.

7.2 Prepare or update traffic and safety analyses addressing neighborhood cut-through routes, crash history, emergency response impacts, and mitigation alternatives.

7.3 Evaluate corridor preservation tools, including right-of-way and easement strategies, dedications, development agreement frameworks, and any necessary legislative actions.

7.4 Finalize corridor mapping for inclusion in the update of the City's Comprehensive Plan

7.5 Provide periodic updates to the Mayor and Council (at least once every 90 days).

SECTION 8. VESTED RIGHTS.

Nothing in this Ordinance is intended to abrogate any Vested Right recognized under applicable Maryland law.

SECTION 9. SEVERABILITY.

If any provision of this Ordinance is held invalid, the remainder shall continue in effect.

SECTION 10. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall take effect as provided by the City Charter. If adopted as an emergency ordinance in accordance with the City Charter's emergency procedure, it shall take effect immediately upon adoption.

DRAFT ORDINANCE

CITY OF TANEYTOWN, MARYLAND

ORDINANCE NO. - 04 2026

AN ORDINANCE to amend Chapter 193, "Vehicles and Traffic," of the Code of the City of Taneytown to (i) prohibit the storage of certain commercial vehicles, trailers, and recreational vehicles on residential streets except for limited active loading/unloading; (ii) authorize immobilization (booting) and removal for violations; (iii) establish procedures for notice, release, and appeal; and (iv) provide for codification, severability, and an effective date.

WHEREAS

A. The Mayor and Council find that the long-term parking or storage of certain commercial vehicles, trailers used to transport equipment, and recreational vehicles on residential streets creates safety hazards, restricts travel lanes and sight distance, impedes emergency access, and negatively impacts traffic flow and neighborhood character; and

B. The Mayor and Council further find that reasonable time-limited loading and unloading is necessary for residents and businesses; and

C. The Mayor and Council desire to provide a clear, enforceable, and fair process, including notice and an opportunity to appeal.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Taneytown, Maryland, as follows:

SECTION 1. Definitions

Chapter 193 is hereby amended by adding a new section to be codified as §193-15.1 to read as follows:

§193-15.1 Street Storage of Certain Vehicles; Immobilization and Removal

A. Definitions. For purposes of this section:

1. **Commercial vehicle** means any motor vehicle that is:
 - (a) registered as a commercial vehicle; or

- (b) owned or leased by a business and primarily used in the course of business; or
 - (c) designed or used to transport tools, equipment, merchandise, construction materials, or similar items, including vehicles with attached racks, liftgates, or permanent equipment boxes;
excluding passenger vehicles used for personal transportation.
2. **Trailer** means any ~~towed vehicle~~trailer, semi-trailer, equipment trailer, cargo trailer, utility trailer, or similar towed conveyance, including any trailer used to transport equipment, materials, or items.
 3. **Recreational vehicle (RV)** includes a motor home, camper, travel trailer, fifth wheel, pop-up camper, or similar vehicle designed for temporary living quarters.
 4. **Residential street** means any public street where the predominant abutting land use is residential (single-family, townhouse, apartment, or similar), as determined by the enforcing officer based on the immediate block face.
 5. **Active loading/unloading** means the continuous, observable transfer of persons or property between a structure/lot and the vehicle or trailer. "Active loading/unloading" does not include leaving a vehicle parked while work occurs elsewhere, staging, resting, waiting, or intermittent activity.
 6. **Immobilization device** means a wheel clamp or similar device ("boot") installed by or under the authority of the City to prevent vehicle movement.
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SECTION 2. Prohibited Street Storage; 30-Minute Exception

B. Prohibited street storage.

1. **General rule.** No person shall park, stand, or store a commercial vehicle, trailer, or recreational vehicle on any residential street for longer than 30 minutes, except while active loading/unloading is occurring.
 2. **Loading/unloading limit.** The active loading/unloading exception is limited to 30 minutes total unless a longer period is expressly authorized by the Chief of Police (or designee) due to documented necessity.
 3. **No activity, must remove.** If active loading/unloading is not occurring, the vehicle or trailer must be removed from the residential street immediately upon notice from an enforcing officer.
 4. **Multiple-unit/complexes.** For multi-family or mixed residential areas, the officer may require that loading/unloading occur as close as practicable to the applicable entrance/loading area and may direct relocation to reduce interference with traffic and safety.
-

SECTION 3. Obstruction and Hazard; Tow Authority

C. Obstruction and hazard.

1. **Immediate hazard.** If any vehicle or trailer is parked or positioned so as to obstruct a travel lane, restrict sight distance, block a driveway or intersection approach, impede emergency access, or otherwise create an immediate traffic hazard, the enforcing officer may order the vehicle moved immediately.
2. **Towing.** If the vehicle is not promptly moved, the City may cause the vehicle to be towed and stored at the owner's expense, consistent with applicable law and other provisions of Chapter 193.

(Note: This keeps "booting" focused on storage violations and allows faster clearance when something is truly in the way.)

SECTION 4. Authority to Boot for Storage Violations

D. Immobilization (booting) for storage violations.

1. **Boot authorization.** When an enforcing officer has reasonable cause to believe a vehicle or trailer is in violation of §193-15.1B, the City may install an immobilization device.
 2. **Notice.** At the time of immobilization, the City shall affix a conspicuous notice to the vehicle or trailer stating:
 - the reason for immobilization;
 - the date/time immobilized;
 - the steps required for release;
 - the applicable fees;
 - the method to request an administrative hearing;
 - a City contact telephone number and hours.
 3. **Release upon payment.** The immobilization device shall be removed upon payment in full of all applicable immobilization fees adopted by resolution, plus any related citations lawfully issued.
 4. **Additional enforcement.** Immobilization does not preclude issuance of citations and does not limit the City's authority to tow when authorized.
 5. **Removal after time.** If a vehicle or trailer remains immobilized for more than 72 hours, the City may cause it to be towed and stored at the owner's expense in addition to immobilization fees, unless a hearing request is pending and the vehicle is not creating a hazard.
-

SECTION 5. Fees Adopted by Resolution

E. Fees. The Mayor and Council shall set immobilization fees by resolution. Fees may include:

1. a one-time immobilization/removal fee; and
 2. a daily immobilization fee accruing after immobilization.
-

SECTION 6. Administrative Hearing / Appeal

F. Administrative hearing.

- ~~1. **Right to hearing.** The registered owner (or person in lawful possession) may request an administrative hearing to contest immobilization and/or the underlying violation.~~
 - ~~2. **Request deadline.** A hearing must be requested within 7 calendar days of the immobilization date.~~
 - ~~3. **Hearing officer.** Hearings shall be conducted by a hearing officer designated by the City Manager (or designee).~~
 - ~~4. **Timing.** The hearing shall be scheduled within 10 business days of the request, to the extent practicable.~~
 - ~~5. **Decision.** The hearing officer shall issue a written decision. If the hearing officer determines the immobilization was not authorized under this section, the City shall refund immobilization fees paid (exclusive of any third-party towing/storage charges not collected by the City), and the related citation(s) shall be handled as provided by law.~~
 - ~~6. **Payment pending hearing.** The City may require payment to secure release pending hearing; if the owner prevails, the City will refund eligible fees.~~
-

SECTION 67. Exemptions

G. Exemptions. This section does not apply to:

1. police, fire, ambulance, and other emergency vehicles;
 2. City vehicles and vehicles under contract to the City while actively performing City work;
 3. utility vehicles actively responding to outages/emergencies;
 4. vehicles or trailers specifically authorized by a temporary right-of-way permit or written authorization from the City.

SECTION 78. Tampering

H. Tampering prohibited. No person shall remove, damage, or tamper with an immobilization device installed under this section. Violations are subject to citation and any other lawful penalties.

SECTION 89. Conforming Amendments to Existing Sections

A. Amend §193-6(C) (Loading/Unloading)

Section **§193-6(C)** is amended by adding the following sentence at the end:

“Notwithstanding the foregoing, loading/unloading of vehicles subject to §193-15.1 on residential streets shall be limited to the time and conditions set forth in §193-15.1.”

B. Amend §193-12 (Maximum Time for Continuous Parking)

Section **§193-12** is amended as follows:

1. In **§193-12(B)** (vehicles over 13,000 lbs and trailers), add after the existing time limit language:

“except as provided in §193-15.1 for residential streets.”

2. In **§193-12(C)** (motor home/camper), add after the existing time limit language:

“except as provided in §193-15.1 for residential streets.”

SECTION 910. Codification; Severability; Effective Date

A. Codification. The Code Editor is authorized to codify, renumber, and make non-substantive formatting changes consistent with this Ordinance.

B. Severability. If any provision of this Ordinance is held invalid, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect.

C. Effective date. This Ordinance shall take effect as provided by the Charter and applicable law.

ORDINANCE 05 – 2026

BESS AND DATA CENTER DEVELOPMENT DEFERRAL

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the City of Taneytown (“City”) are charged with protecting and promoting the public health, safety, and welfare of the community, including land use compatibility, infrastructure capacity, emergency response readiness, and neighborhood, environmental, and community impacts; and

WHEREAS, the City has received and/or reasonably anticipates inquiries and proposals involving Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS), Data Centers, and related supporting uses that may present unique and substantial impacts on electric service, water and wastewater service, stormwater, roadway networks, noise, lighting, fire suppression and emergency response, hazardous materials management, and other public services; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council find that the City’s existing land use regulations may not adequately address the location, design, scale, utility demand, public safety standards, and community impacts associated with large-scale BESS and Data Centers, including but not limited to standards for siting, setbacks, screening, noise limits, life-safety and fire code coordination, decommissioning, financial security, and utility interconnection; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council further find that it is in the public interest to temporarily pause approval of such uses to allow the City time to evaluate local impacts, coordinate with utilities and relevant agencies, prepare and consider appropriate legislation, and accept public comment; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TANEYTOWN, MARYLAND, that:

SECTION 1. TITLE.

This Ordinance shall be known as the “BESS and Data Center Deferral Ordinance.”

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS.

For purposes of this Ordinance:

2.1 Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) — Covered

“Battery Energy Storage System (BESS)” means one or more stationary battery-based devices capable of storing electrical energy and releasing it later, including all associated equipment such as power conversion systems, inverters, transformers, switchgear, cooling systems, fire suppression systems, enclosures/containers, fencing, access drives, and related facilities, that meets any of the following thresholds:

- (a) Aggregate nameplate stored energy capacity of 0.5 MWh (500 kWh) or greater; or
- (b) Aggregate nameplate power rating of 1 MW (1,000 kW) or greater (AC or DC as specified by manufacturer); or
- (c) A system designed, configured, or proposed to export power to the electric grid, provide grid services, or participate in utility/wholesale market operations (regardless of size).

Express Exclusions (not covered by this deferral):

BESS does not include:

1. Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) systems and similar short-duration backup systems installed inside a building that serve the principal use on the same property;
2. Battery systems that are accessory to a permitted principal use and have an aggregate capacity below 500 kWh and are not designed to export power to the grid;
3. Consumer/portable batteries and devices not installed as stationary infrastructure.

2.2 Data Center — Covered

“Data Center” means a building or portion of a building whose primary purpose is the housing and operation of computer servers and related equipment for the storage, processing, and transmission of digital data (including colocation and cloud facilities), together with directly supporting mechanical/electrical infrastructure, that meets any of the following:

- (a) 2,500 square feet or more of gross floor area dedicated to server rooms, data halls, and directly supporting mechanical/electrical space; or
- (b) Demonstrated or proposed IT load (critical load) of 250 kW or greater; or
- (c) The facility is proposed, marketed, or operated as a colocation, cloud, or third-party hosted data processing facility (regardless of size).

Express Exclusions (not covered by this deferral):

“Data Center” does not include a normal server room, telecom room, network closet, or small IT suite that is accessory to the primary use on the same parcel, not operated as colocation/cloud/third-party hosting, and which is both:

1. Under 2,500 square feet, and
2. Under 250 kW IT load (or documented equivalent electrical demand).

2.3 Related Uses

“Related Uses” means principal or accessory facilities customarily incidental to, supportive of, or co-located with a covered BESS or covered Data Center as defined in Sections 2.1 and 2.2, including (but not limited to): new or expanded substations or switchyards constructed primarily for the project; backup generation systems and fuel storage; cooling plants; electrical yards; water reuse or treatment systems serving the project; telecommunications yards; and similar utility-intensive infrastructure.

2.4 Covered Approvals

“Covered Approvals” means any City approval, permit, license, certificate, plan approval, or authorization required for the construction, establishment, expansion, or operation of a covered BESS, covered Data Center, or Related Use, including but not limited to: zoning approvals, special exceptions/conditional uses, variances (to the extent sought for establishment/intensity), zoning certificates/zoning permits, site plan approvals, subdivision approvals (if part of the project), grading permits, and building permits.

2.5 Complete Application

“Complete Application” means an application that contains all required forms, fees, plans, studies, and supporting documents required by City regulations for a filing determination.

2.6 Material Modification / Expansion

“Material Modification” means any change that increases capacity, IT load, footprint, intensity, utility demand, exporting capability, noise, lighting, traffic, hazardous materials, or other impacts beyond what was previously approved or lawfully existing.

2.7 Vested Right

“Vested Right” means any vested right recognized under applicable Maryland law.

SECTION 3. DEFERRAL ESTABLISHED.

3.1 Deferral Imposed

During the Deferral Period (Section 4), the City shall not approve any Covered Approval for a covered BESS, covered Data Center, or Related Use within the City limits, except as expressly allowed in Section 5 (Exemptions) or Section 6 (Relief).

3.2 No Processing; No Final Approvals; Tolling

The City shall not accept applications for Covered Approvals during the Deferral Period. Applications shall not be processed for substantive review, and no final approvals shall be issued during the Deferral Period (unless exempt or granted relief). All applicable deadlines are tolled as provided in Section 7.

3.3 Scope

This deferral applies to:

- (a) new establishment of a covered BESS, covered Data Center, or Related Use;
 - (b) expansion, repowering, or Material Modification of an existing BESS, Data Center, or Related Use that increases capacity, footprint, intensity, IT load, utility demand, exporting capability, or impacts; and
 - (c) any request for approvals intended to authorize such uses, whether as a principal or accessory use.
-

SECTION 4. DEFERRAL PERIOD; SUNSET.

4.1 Initial Term (180 Days)

The deferral shall begin on the Effective Date and shall remain in effect for one hundred eighty (180) days, unless repealed earlier by the Mayor and Council.

4.2 Extension

The Mayor and Council may extend the Deferral by subsequent ordinance(s) if they make written findings that the extension remains necessary to accomplish the purposes stated herein; provided, however, that the total deferral period shall not exceed eighteen (18) months from the original Effective Date unless the Mayor and Council expressly find that additional time is required due to circumstances outside the City's control.

SECTION 5. EXEMPTIONS.

This Ordinance does not apply to:

5.1 Existing Operating Facilities (Non-Expansion)

Routine maintenance, repair, and replacement-in-kind of equipment at an existing, lawfully operating BESS or Data Center, provided the work does not increase capacity, IT load, footprint, intensity, utility demand, exporting capability, or impacts beyond the thresholds and definitions in Sections 2.1 and 2.2.

5.2 Public Safety / Emergency Work

Work necessary to address immediate threats to public health and safety, including emergency repairs to City or public utility infrastructure.

5.3 Accessory Backup Power and Accessory IT Rooms

Accessory UPS systems, emergency backup batteries, and accessory server rooms/telecom rooms that fall within the express exclusions in Sections 2.1 and 2.2, and which are accessory to a permitted principal use, are exempt and may proceed under normal permitting.

5.4 Non-Covered Uses

Facilities that do not meet the definitions and thresholds of covered BESS, covered Data Center, or Related Uses as defined herein are not subject to this Ordinance.

SECTION 6. TOLLING OF DEADLINES.

6.1 Tolling

Any deadlines for City action on applications subject to this Ordinance are tolled during the Deferral period, including internal processing timelines that would otherwise run during the deferral..

SECTION 7. CITY WORK PLAN DURING DEFERRAL; PUBLIC COMMENT.

During the Deferral Period, the City shall pursue the following actions to the extent feasible:

7.1 Utility and Infrastructure Review

Coordinate with electric and other utilities, the Fire Department, emergency management, and relevant agencies to evaluate interconnection considerations, reliability impacts, emergency response needs, and infrastructure capacity implications, including (as applicable) water, wastewater, stormwater, roadways, and communications.

7.2 Draft Legislation

Staff shall prepare proposed legislative language addressing covered BESS, covered Data Centers, and Related Uses, including recommended definitions, zoning district applicability, approval pathways, setbacks, buffering/screening, noise/lighting, traffic and construction impacts, stormwater, hazardous materials and life-safety coordination, decommissioning standards, and financial assurance.

7.3 Community Impact Evaluation

Staff and Council shall evaluate potential community impacts, including land use compatibility, visual impacts, noise, environmental considerations, public safety, and effects on public services and infrastructure.

7.4 Public Comment

The City shall provide opportunities for public comment during the deferral period, including at least one public work session and/or public hearing prior to any adoption of permanent regulations.

7.5 Progress Updates

Staff shall provide periodic updates to the Mayor and Council (recommended: at least once every 60 days).

SECTION 8. ENFORCEMENT; NO PRIVATE RIGHT.

8.1 Enforcement

Any approval issued in violation of this Ordinance is voidable to the extent permitted by law. The City may pursue enforcement as authorized by law.

8.2 No Private Right

This Ordinance does not create a private right of action.

SECTION 9. VESTED RIGHTS.

Nothing in this Ordinance is intended to abrogate any Vested Right recognized under applicable Maryland law. Where a Vested Right exists, the City shall process the matter consistent with that right, subject to lawful conditions.

SECTION 10. SEVERABILITY.

If any provision of this Ordinance is held invalid, the remainder shall continue in effect.

SECTION 11. REPEALER.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this Ordinance are repealed to the extent of the inconsistency.

SECTION 12. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall take effect as provided by the City Charter. If adopted as an emergency ordinance in accordance with the City Charter's emergency procedure, it shall take effect immediately upon adoption.
