

#### This Afternoon and Tonight

- Scattered to numerous severe thunderstorms this afternoon and evening
  - Most likely start times (moving west to east):
    - I-4 PM West of Blue Ridge/Catoctins
    - 4-8 PM East of Blue Ridge/Catoctins, including Baltimore/Washington
       Metropolitan Areas
  - Some areas could see multiple rounds of storms.
- Damaging wind gusts in excess of 60 mph will be the main threat
  - A few storms could produce wind gusts in excess of 70 mph
  - Tornadoes and large hail are also possible
    - Potential of an isolated significant tornado (EF2+)


### Severe Weather Threat Today


Moderate Risk (Level 4 of 5)






- LOCATION: All of Maryland
- **TIMING**: 2 PM 11 PM, moving from west to east through the afternoon and evening.
- THREATS: <u>High Likelihood</u> of widespread damaging winds, some hurricane-force.
  - Potential of an isolated significant tornado (EF2+).
  - o Large Hail.
- IMPACTS: Widespread tree and powerline damage. Isolated structural damage.
   Potential for long-standing power outages and blocked roads.








#### Damaging Wind Threat

Significant wind damage is possible





**Chance of Severe Thunderstorm Gusts over 58 mph** 

- Widespread, significant wind damage is likely across all of Maryland
  - The greatest threat is in the pink shaded area on the map (to the left)
- Many storms will produce wind gusts over 60 mph, with the strongest storms will be capable of producing wind gusts over 70 mph.
  - Highest threat for this is in hatched area

## Storm Safety

Actions for personal safety



- Stay weather-aware today. Use NWS Watches & Warnings for timing the threat in your location.
- Don't be outdoors when storms arrive. When you hear thunder, go indoors to a sturdy building or structure.
- While seeking shelter indoors, go to the lowest floor to an interior room. Stay away from windows.
  - Those in mobile homes or weaker structures should plan ahead of time to shelter in a stronger structure.
- Be prepared for extended power outages, and the potential for some roads to be blocked by fallen trees.
- For after event cleanup, don't go outside until 30 minutes after you hear the last thunder; otherwise you are still susceptible to lightning.
- Be aware of downed power lines and unstable branches/trees.

# **Know Where to Go**

When Sheltering from a Tornado



If you have no basement, move to an interior room with no windows.

Exterior rooms and rooms with windows DO NOT protect you.

NO PLACE OUTSIDE is safe from a tornado.

Quickly move to your basement and bring your emergency supply kit.

- Monitor NWS Watches & Warnings. Plan ahead to be in a strong shelter when the storms arrive.
